

HeartBrothers Celebrate Successful Golf Tournament Money Raised in 2023 puts 7-Year Total over the \$500,000 Mark

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Marlborough, MASS. – Sept. 12, 2023 – The HeartBrothers Foundation is pleased to announce that its largest fundraiser of the year, the Mike Gustin Memorial Golf Classic, raised \$80,000 that will benefit heart failure patients and their families.

Held in August at the Marshfield Country Club, the 7th annual Gustin tournament featured 160 golfers and friends who were hoping the event would boost the event's total earnings over the half-million-dollar mark. When the final numbers were figured, the tally was \$518,000.

"We want to thank our friends, sponsors and families for helping us get past our goal of \$500,000 raised. The mission of the HeartBrothers Foundation is to provide support for heart failure patients and their families and this money enables us to do just that," said HBF Co-Founder Patrick Sullivan.

Jay Toland, a recent heart transplant recipient, served as the keynote speaker. Toland, who lives in Sturbridge, credits the HeartBrothers Foundation with providing financial help that ensured he made it to all his medical appointments in Boston.

<u>The HeartBrothers Foundation</u> (HBF) serves thousands of heart failure patients with emotional and financial support, a patient support group, educational webinars and other resources. The foundation also runs the HeartBrothers House in Boston, where heart failure patients and their families can stay during treatment.

The annual golf tournament is held in memory of Mike Gustin, who passed away in 2015 at the age of 64. Gustin battled heart disease since 1996 and, as his health deteriorated, his family traveled back-and-forth to the hospital, incurring personal and financial hardship. During one hospital visit, Gustin's daughter Katie Gerstel met Sullivan, who promised the foundation's assistance. Sullivan and fellow transplant recipient Robert Romer started the foundation in 2014. The two met when they each spent a year at Tufts Medical Center waiting for new hearts, and promised each other that, if they survived, they would dedicate their lives to helping other heart failure patients.

The Gustin family is one of many the organization has supported over the years.
